Come, Holy Spirit, Living in Mary!

Preparing for Pentecost with Mary, the Mother of Jesus

In the chapel at our office here at WWCCR, a large image of the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost occupies much of the wall to the left of the tabernacle. I pray with it often as food for meditation. Like most images depicting this pivotal moment, two persons are really the focal point of the entire composition: the Holy Spirit, and Mary, the Mother of Jesus. The apostles fan out on the right and the left of Mary, all gazing above her head and reacting in different ways to the Holy Spirit coming down upon them in the form of a dove, as flames radiate from Him and rest in tongues of fire above their heads. What a mystery! Some point, others look shocked, and most stare in open-mouthed awe. Mary alone seems unsurprised, serene, and perhaps filled with a quiet but very great joy. She is kneeling, with her hands clasped, her face tilted upwards in the midst of the action and (holy!) chaos.

The Scriptures highlight that the apostles felt drawn to pray with Mary when it describes the original community in Jerusalem: "All these devoted themselves with one accord to prayer, together with some

women, and Mary the mother of Jesus ..." (Acts 1:14) Even though she isn't mentioned by name at the beginning of the Pentecost narrative, every artist who has portrayed this scene has put her front and center, surrounded by the apostles. Many of us may wonder at this, because while we know Mary is a vital player in salvation history, we may not think that her role was the most exciting or the most important at Pentecost, second only to the Holy Spirit Himself. Why not Peter? After all, he was the one who stood up to give a speech to the crowds as they gathered to find out what the hubbub was all about. Why Mary?

This year, I felt like the Holy Spirit opened my eyes and woke me up dramatically to the answer to this question as I worked my way through the book, 33 Days to Morning Glory: A Do-It-Yourself Retreat in Preparation for Marian Consecration by Father Michael Gaitley, MIC. For the record, this was probably the fifth time I had read this book, and the sixth consecutive year I had prepared to renew my consecration to Jesus through Mary. I thought I knew this book insideout, upside-down and backwards by now! But nine days into the retreat,

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We're approaching the halfway point of the Jubilee year for the Catholic Charismatic Renewal. In our archdiocese, we will be celebrating Pentecost at St. Louise in Bellevue on June 3rd. We are cosponsoring this exciting celebration with the Renewed in Christ prayer group. We see signs all around us that God is fertilizing the soil of people's hearts to receive with total surrender the stirring up of His Spirit with baptism in the Holy Spirit—by means of the Wild Goose videos and the Alpha series, for example. Within our own ministry, Dwelling Place was launched some four years ago and, in April, Nights of Worship had an inspired beginning. In addition, we offered "Introduction

to the Prophetic Gifts" classes. All of these are ways the Spirit is moving, touching and changing lives. Thank You, God!

We are working on a Strategic Plan for the next 10 years, asking God, listening, and discerning His desire for the work of this ministry. Please keep this important work in your prayers. It is our mission at WWCCR to teach and impart to others how and what it means to live a life infused by the Holy Spirit. Being baptized in the Spirit is the first step. Living out our baptism and walking in all that God has for us as "Spirit-filled" people requires surrender or docility to the Spirit and formation. This is the heart of our ministry. This year in the newsletter articles, we have highlighted how God is moving. We hope you are blessed by them, and hope that God is awakening in you a desire to participate in this important work.

It is interesting to note, in light of this special year of Jubilee, that there are several other significant anniversaries that fall in 2017. Did you know it is the 500-year anniversary of the Protestant Reformation as well as the 100-year anniversary of Fatima? Consider how God has planned from the beginning of time to use this year for healing and unity within His people. Alleluia! Are you ready?

Let us pray in unison the prayers that have been handed down through the ages. Many saints have prayed these prayers with miraculous results. Do you believe miracles can happen in your life? Let us pray these powerful prayers together—the Pentecost Sequence, Come Creator Spirit, and the Pentecost Novena. We will post these on our website for your convenience.

May the Lord bless us with His Spirit, living in Mary, and fall afresh on all of us this Pentecost. Amen!

I felt like I got hit over the head by a divine two-byfour! What I was reading was so amazing and new to me; it was as if I had never read that chapter before. I almost wondered in earnest whether I had accidentally picked up some new edition of the book, instead of what I'd read in previous years. It radically changed how I understood Mary, and it came through understanding her intimate relationship with the Holy Spirit.

Now, for those of us who are drawn to the Charismatic Renewal, the Holy Spirit has made a big impact in our lives personally. Perhaps an experience of baptism of the Holy Spirit, that actualization of the gifts we received at confirmation, has completely changed the way we pray and understand our relationship with Jesus. For us, the Holy Spirit has given us a new awakening in our life of faith and a conviction that

God the Father really loves us personally, tenderly, and passionately. We may feel excited to grow in the freedom He gives us in His Spirit. Or, if we haven't experienced this yet, we desire it, and we pray for the Lord to send us His Holy Spirit to transform our lives and set us on fire with His love.

In his book, Fr. Michael Gaitley quotes St. Maximilian Kolbe's revelation about Mary at length, specifically about her name "the Immaculate Conception" which she revealed to St. Bernadette at Lourdes. What

does this have to do with the Holy Spirit? Apparently, everything! St. Maximilian Kolbe says that Mary takes this name the way spouses share a name. He describes the union with Mary and the Holy Spirit in this way:

"What type of union is this [between the Holy Spirit and Mary]? It is above all an interior union, a union of her essence with the 'essence' of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit dwells in her, lives in her. This was true from the first instant of her existence. It was always true; it will be always true."

He goes on to say about the Holy Spirit:

"In what does this life of the Spirit in Mary consist? He himself is uncreated Love in her; the love of the Father and of the Son, the Love by which God loves himself, the very love of the Most Holy Trinity. He is a fruitful Love, a 'Conception.' Among creatures made in God's image the union brought about by married love is the most intimate of all. (cf. Mt 19:6) In a much more precise, more interior, more essential manner, the Holy Spirit lives in the soul of the Immaculata [Mary], in the

depths of her very being. He makes her fruitful, from the very first instant of her existence, all during her life, and for all eternity." (*Sketch, February 17, 1941*)

In a mysterious way, the Holy Spirit is the true "Immaculate Conception," and Mary shares that name, not because she is God, but because she is so intimately united with Him.

This led me to imagine Mary with fresh eyes, and I felt a connection with her that I hadn't been able to make before! Try to imagine a person in your life who inspires that desire for God in you, who appears to be living in that freedom, peace, and joy that can only come from God. Perhaps that person is a good friend of yours, or perhaps it is a charismatic speaker whose testimony inspires you, or perhaps you've read about someone, like Saint Teresa of Calcutta for example, who lived in habitual docility of spirit to the Lord's inspiration and impressed everyone she met

inspiration and impressed everyone she met with her joy and deep love for them.

Regardless of who comes to mind for

Regardless of who comes to mind for you, even though they are human beings, sinners like ourselves still in need of healing, they have reached a point where they are transparent enough to give us a taste of God's unconditional love. Now, try to imagine the freedom of someone who is completely purified and healed in relation to God and their fellow man. This person

has no resistance to God at all – no fear, stubbornness, resentment, or impatience. They are full of peace and a deep joy in every situation. 1 Corinthians 13:4 paints a good portrait of their love: everything we could want to encounter in another human being is there. They are alive, and they give us life when we are around them. This is everything we were meant to be, "man (or woman) fully alive." (St. Catherine of Siena) This is what Jesus came to restore to us through His passion, death, and resurrection.

And this is who Mary is! She is *full* of grace, living in the Holy Spirit. It's no wonder that the apostles gathered around her after Jesus ascended to the Father, especially during those nine days of waiting in Jerusalem. She was the one person they knew who most faithfully and beautifully communicated God to them in her words, actions, and prayers. While she may have seemed very ordinary in most ways, her simplest glance or word could touch their hearts in a way no one else's could.

Whatever your relationship with Mary today, let me propose a simple prayer Fr. Michael Gaitley repeats at the end of every day of his retreat: "Come, Holy Spirit, living in Mary!" This year, as we commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Renewal, and 40 years for WWCCR itself, let's prepare our hearts to receive all the graces of Pentecost. Let's welcome Mary, the Mother of God, into the home of our hearts, where she can teach us about receptivity to the Holy Spirit, perhaps in a way we've never known before. Let us pray in thanksgiving for the gifts of love that the Lord wants to pour out into our hearts. With delicacy and gentleness, our Blessed Mother, with all the joy and warmth of a woman fully alive, can draw out of our hearts the child within and teach us how to trust God more deeply than ever before. Come, Holy Spirit, living in Mary, enkindle in us the fire of Your love!


