

I was part of an amazing small group and received soaking prayer Saturday night before I left for home. When I woke up that Sunday and went to work at St. Andrew's,

I couldn't stop smiling. I had this unexplainable joy and could see Jesus in everything. I was happy for no reason other than God's goodness. My heart was different; it was healed.

The following Friday, I attended a prayer service at Our Lady of Perpetual Help for the 50th anniversary of the Charismatic Renewal. As we were praying, a special lady said three powerful words: "Let it go." I have a tendency to hold on to things, especially things I cannot control. She said to me, "Jesus doesn't want you to carry these things. You need to let it go." I unleashed giant cleansing tears. My joy was even greater after that. I believe that prayer time sealed the healing I received the week before. God is so amazing and I love His timing. I am so grateful. A couple months after the retreat while at work, a gal came up to me and said as she began to cry: "You look so different, Amy. You are glowing. What is it?" I said, "Well, I have a new relationship with Jesus." – Amy Gallwas

Praise God! That is what our mission is. That is the desire of God's heart: that the Holy Spirit would bring each person into a personal, intimate, life-changing relationship with Jesus. He Passed by Me

In Exodus 33:22, our Lord spoke to Moses, "Here is a place beside Me. You must stand on the rock, and when My glory passes by, I will put you in a cleft of the rock and shield you with My hand while I pass by. Then I will take My hand away and you shall see the back of Me, but My face is not to be seen."

As we celebrate 50 years of Catholic Charismatic Renewal in the U.S., 40 years of WWCCR's ministry in Seattle, the 100-year anniversary of Our Lady in

Fatima, and 125 years of Mass celebrated here in my own parish, I can reflect on the 'passage of God' in my own life. My father often told me that if you want to know where you are going, take a look at where you've come from. I was raised in the Catholic Church, in a small town in Maine. Our family moved to Western Washington in 1963. I was blessed with a

close-knit family who enjoyed the simplicity of family life: daily chores, family mealtimes, sight-seeing road trips, and Sunday Mass. I am the oldest of six and have always been blessed with a strong faith. This faith was given to me at birth. I believe everyone is given this gift, as Romans 5:5 tells us, "[...] because the love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which has been given us."

I have always been thankful for this gift, recognizing that the Mass, the music, and the prayers have a holy peace and presence that appears nowhere else in the world! Encouraged as a child, I received wonderful teaching and have always known that I could speak directly to God, His Mother, and the angels and saints. I have experienced His voice and His promptings as a natural part of my spiritual life and my conscience. So this is where I come from. Just like everyone else, I come from the heart of God. In the Charismatic Renewal we often hear terms like "a personal relationship with Jesus," "walking with God," and "moving in the Spirit." As I look back on my early life, I have experienced these things. I realize now that this was due to my family, my church, and my God.

Journeying as an adult, I was often distracted by "the world." School, marriage, family, and career would often steal my attention and time from my spiritual life. I am no different from others and I struggled to hear Him speak to me, mostly because I didn't take time to listen. GLEANINGS "You must stand on the rock," He says in Exodus. And we all know that rock is Him. We fall, and looking back, I can see where He has put me in the cleft of the rock and shielded me and protected me. He has shown me mercy and continued to call my name.

Through my introduction to Catholic Charismatic Renewal, I learned new ways to speak to Him, to praise Him, to worship Him and I met others on this same journey. In the mid-1980's I was invited to my first charismatic prayer meeting where I heard excited Catholics praising, worshiping, and prophesying with prayer in tongues. This event was a fork in the road for me, and for the next two years I prayed more, read Scripture, and made new friends. Music ministry at Mass

and attending prayer group had already become part of my week, and threatened to disrupt my family, job, and the life I had known. On Christmas Eve, in the choir loft at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, I experienced baptism in the Holy Spirit while singing (of course). The tears and the joy were overwhelming and I promised the Lord, "I will do whatever

You ask of me." The closeness to God the Holy Spirit was something brand new to me and I knew my life would be changed from that moment on.

My journey has taken me to more than 30 years of hungering for His Word and other writings about Him and His Church. I desire to know more about the saints. I believe He has called me to a life of praising Him through music and liturgy, but not without bringing others along! I believe that through my prayer group, charismatic gatherings, and friendships, He has shown me His face and I believe that someday I will say, "Show me Your glory, Lord," and He will.

Fr. Peter-Hans Kolvenbach, SJ, shared this meditation: "In this sense, it is less than a matter of searching for God than of allowing oneself to be found by Him in all of life's situations, where He does not cease to pass and where He allows Himself to be recognized once He has really passed." I have seen His back for He has certainly passed by me. I have known Him all my life. In the song, "Gracious God" by Jesse Manibusan, the verse reads, "Through this journey we will follow, for we long to see Your Face." So pass by me, Lord, while I follow, longing to see Your Face in glory...

My Experience of Baptism in the Holy Spirit

I was a 19-year-old college student on summer break when I encountered the Holy Spirit. Baptized and confirmed as a Lutheran, I had loved Jesus since my youth and desired to express my commitment to Christ in the only way I knew at the time: I planned

to become a pastor. I headed off to a well-known Lutheran college and promptly fell flat on my face, confronted by secular skepticism and the frailties of my human weakness.

I returned home after my first year humbled and quite depressed,

still desiring to follow God with all my heart, but realizing I didn't know how. One day, I was alone at our house reading a fictional book by C.S. Lewis in which he described a man being suddenly surrounded by the presence of God and in direct communication with his Creator. The passage struck me to the core, and in the depth of my soul I offered up a simple but very earnest prayer: "I really want that kind of relationship with you, Lord."

Suddenly, God was in the room with me, or perhaps it would be better said, I was in God. The experience was far beyond words. Physically, it felt as if a cool electrical wind was blowing from infinity to infinity as it passed through every cell of my being. Psychologically, "the peace of God that surpasses all understanding" enveloped me, instantly driving away my depression. Spiritually, I knew beyond a shadow of doubt that God had manifested himself to me in an

undeniable and life-changing way.

faith life. Through God's mercy, and despite my lack of understanding about baptism in the Holy Spirit, God had heard my cry and responded. From that

I offered up a simple but very earnest prayer: "I really want that kind of relationship with you, Lord." point forward, the Spirit of God guided me, often dramatically, steering me to a Lutheran Bible college and then to subsequent encounters with Christians of many backgrounds who taught me about the Holy Spirit.

Over a period of many years, seeking to know God more fully, the Holy Spirit led me to the Catholic Church. To be honest, despite all the miracles I'd witnessed in my life, I was afraid and I hardened my heart. It took two decades for me to fully respond to God's invitation. Today, I gladly declare

respond to God's invitation. Today, I gladly declare that I'm so grateful for my Lutheran upbringing which grounded me in Christ. I'm so appreciative for my many non-denominational brothers and sisters who instructed me in the ways of the Spirit. And I'm so thankful to the Holy Spirit, who led me home to the Catholic Church, to the deepest expressions of prayer, into communion with the saints, and most profoundly, to a more intimate relationship with the Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Humbled and Chosen

My walk with Jesus started very unwillingly. My mom would make sure we got a ride to Sunday school with the neighbor. She would come to church most Sundays. My grandparents were German Lutherans so that is what we were. It was in the 9th grade during Confirmation time that my spirit began to awaken. I would spend hours trying to memorize the assigned sections of the Catechism. I asked the pastor about the Creed where it says that we believe in the "catholic" church. He said that "catholic church" included all the denominations that believe in Jesus. I knew that I wanted to be a part of HIS big Church. So I became "catholic" in the broader sense of the term.

In years to come I would love the verse in Ephesians 4:4 that says: "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call." It became an important block in my foundation of faith when I was involved in jail ministry. We were required to minister to any and all that came to us. Also, we were not allowed to contact those that we ministered to outside of jail. So I learned to trust the Holy Spirit to finish the work that He started in them through us.

There was a time life was very hard for me. I was invited to the charismatic prayer group at the Queen of Angels parish. They took me in and just loved me. I can't tell you how they loved me. Maybe it was that I could see that they loved each other. I was 40 years old. I wanted to do good and be good. But I had no means within me to do that.

I was invited to a conference called, "Fire of the Holy Spirit." I came to a new understanding of Acts 1:5,8 (NABRE): "For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit [...] you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

I don't have words to tell you what happened to me that day. I found myself lying on the floor immersed in the love of the Father. It was like Jesus Himself opened my heart and poured a pitcher full of His Holy Spirit power into it. My life was changed in an instant.

Since then, my wife and I have traveled around the island of Mindanao in the Philippines telling of the love of Jesus to small churches. There is a huge population of people in the Philippines living in the countryside who can't get to church because they have no transportation. They form what I call "family neighborhood churches." The average church in the Philippines has 50 members.

I went to Africa on a three-week mission trip to work in an orphanage. There was a small church that met in the orphanage, and they asked me to tell them the story of Jesus. The room was full, at about 50 people. Every window was open with two or three people looking in and, they said, there were more people sitting on the grass outside. I want to cry thinking about it. I had never been to college or Bible school. I had worked with my hands all my life. It is a humbling thing to be chosen. Why me, Lord? There is nothing good in me but You!

About four years ago I joined the Catholic Church. I knew God was calling me to be a part of Dwelling Place at St. Stephen the Martyr in Renton. I have asked God to allow me to be at the tip of His sword of the Spirit so I could be where the action is located. He has been so very gracious to allow me to see dozens pulled from the pit of hell, saved, healed and set on the road to victory. Deep inside I feel a unifying of the Church is taking place, and that we are in a time of harvest when many will come to know what true love is - the love of Jesus. Good things are on the way!

featuring the prayer groups of St. Nicholas in Gig Harbor, celebrating 41 years of prayer and fellowship

At St. Nicholas in Gig Harbor, there are two prayer groups that have been around before WWCCR formed as a ministry. The Archdiocese requested the incorporation of what is now WWCCR precisely to help support the many prayer groups throughout the Northwest.

It began this way: in 1976, on Thursday nights, five people began to meet to praise and worship God. As time went by, more and more joined the group and it became known as the Open Door Prayer Group. In January 1977, a Life in the Spirit seminar was presented at the parish and the numbers swelled on Thursday nights. So many couples and single men and women came, in fact, that the women decided to also meet on Tuesday mornings so that they could share more regarding what the Lord was doing in their lives. The Tuesday morning prayer group became the Prayer and Share Women's Group. Women would volunteer their homes and they hired a babysitter to watch the preschoolers. Eventually the group moved to the church to accommodate their growing numbers. The numbers of women involved in the Prayer and Share Group has continually increased since an additional Life in the Spirit seminar held in October 2010.

Many people have come and gone over the years, but the two groups have remained a place to praise the Lord, share their Catholic faith, and intercede for family, friends and the world. Happy 41st Anniversary to all the women and men who have kept these prayer groups alive all these years! Thank You, Holy Spirit, for continuing to stir into flame the gifts they have received through the Sacraments. Amen.

A Message of Gratitude from Sherry Weddell

I owe WWCCR, Virginia King, and Ron Ryan a big debt for giving me the opportunity to create and develop what is now called the Called & Gifted discernment process for three and a half years before the Catherine of Siena Institute was founded in 1997. Ron suggested it in the first place and recruited the first 20 Renewal leaders to attend in the fall of 1993. I knew very little but thought it sounded like fun and created and gave the first workshop as a volunteer. I had no idea how profoundly God would use those early efforts to change my life. In the 24 years since, we have taken 100,000 Catholics through the discernment process in three languages across North America, Europe, Asia, and Oceania, including Singapore, Hong Kong, and Papua, Indonesia. I am in the middle of revising the discernment process again to help meet the requests pouring in from around the world! The fruit of WWCCR's support and encouragement is literally changing the lives of Catholics all over the world right now! May God continue to bless and use you in amazing ways!
