THE FLIGHT INTO EGYPT

God Will Always Make a Way

The story of the Flight into Egypt recorded in Saint Matthew's Gospel (Mt 2:13-15) is a powerful reminder of how God provides for us even in the midst of disappointing experiences.

Mary and Joseph had just experienced the birth of their son,

Jesus. At a time when they should have been able to relax and enjoy this monumental and life-changing event, instead they must flee for the safety of Jesus. They are pressed by the forces of evil via Herod's crazy thirst for power. I remember well the line in Franco Zeffirelli's miniseries Jesus of Nazareth where Herod yells, "I refuse to share my power with anyone."

Joseph was a wonderful custodian and protector of Jesus, and the angel announcing to him that he must flee is a beautiful reminder that God always takes care of His children. Matthew also sees this event as a fulfillment of the words of the prophet Hosea, "Out of Egypt I called my son" (Hosea 11:1).

Egypt was the land of slavery for the Israelites. They made their Exodus from the land of Egypt to the promised land and yet Mary and Joseph return there with Jesus. Isn't this just a reminder that God's grace is greater than all of the forces of evil we encounter in our lives? God is always at work doing amazing things especially when we have to rearrange our plans and things don't always go the way we think they should go. There is no land or area of our lives that isn't touchable by God's

grace. We often want to avoid going back to painful memories and events in our lives because we think that they were devoid of God's grace or somehow not part of His plan for us. This is where we need to remember the words of St. Paul that, "We know that all things work for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28).

The past seven months have been very challenging for all of us with the COVID 19 virus. Out of

concern for our safety and the safety of others, we have all had to modify our plans and cancel many events that we were looking forward to enjoying. I know many of my parishioners have been out of work and are growing anxious about how they are going to provide for their

families. We, too, have to believe that God is allowing us to experience this painful event to bring some kind of good out of it.

God, our Father, sent His only begotten Son into the world to show us that by trusting in Him, we can overcome our sins and the reality of human suffering and learn to live a life that is focused on loving God and loving people. As Paul reminds us in Romans, "Where sin abounds grace abounds all the more" (Romans 5:20).

I will never forget in my own life how sad and disappointed I was when my Aunt Lynn (Godmother) became ill with cancer. At one point in this difficult journey, we were told that she was miraculously healed from the cancer. As a fourteen-year-old teenager l received the word with great joy. I prayed for her healing and God answered my prayers. A few years later, I discovered the doctors were wrong. The cancer wasn't all gone and had spread and would eventually end her life at the age of 47. I felt so let down and disappointed. How could a good and loving God

allow such a thing to happen? I began to withdraw in my heart and started growing cynical about the power of prayer. I knew something was terribly wrong with me and didn't want to allow my heart to become hardened. One night, after hearing a powerful testimony from a speaker in our Confirmation class, I followed the speaker's suggestion that I needed to lay all of my disappointments in front of Jesus and invite Him into my heart to be the Lord and Savior of my life. That was a life-changing decision and by the end of that year in high school, I was convinced God was calling me to become a Catholic priest. God's amazing love brought something beautiful out of what I thought was just a tragedy. I remember this event whenever I am disappointed in how things are going in my life. It was as if the Lord was saying, "I'm not through with you and if you trust in Me, I will show you that I am very much at work in your life especially in sufferings and tragedies." There is nothing too great for God's grace to reach down and surprise us. Thirty years later, while I was attending Steubenville Northwest in Spokane (2016), the Lord had

a powerful experience for me during Eucharistic Adoration that reminded me of this truth. I was reduced to tears at His goodness during this event.

The Flight into Egypt reminds us that God will always make a way for us. We don't always understand how God is working with us when we have to alter our plans and make changes in our lives. We must believe that God allows things to happen for a greater purpose. That's why we love our crucifixes as Catholics. Something that looks horrific and difficult to gaze on turns out to be the most enduring sign of God's love for us. From the cross Jesus redeemed us from our sins and then poured out His amazing love through the Holy Spirit.

God is very much at work through all of our experiences in life. Prayer will help us grasp this truth more effectively.

The Flight into Egypt reminds us that God will make a way for us. Our world is very fallen and so often not seeking God's ways. Let's pray for attentiveness to His divine plan for us and growth in discernment.

Messages from God

In March of 2020 our entire country screeched to a halt. Overnight I was informed that I would no longer be able to attend Mass, participate in prayer ministry or spend time with my family. I was told that I would live in complete isolation for an undetermined amount of time. I desperately needed to feel the presence of God and began to pray (sometimes beg) God to speak to me. I needed assurance and I needed direction. I heard in my head, "Your answers are in the bible. They were written before you asked." As I began to pray with my bible open, I was led to some beautiful messages from God. The messages sometimes expounded on a favorite verse and other times were new for me.

I began with Philippians 4:6-7:
"Have no anxiety at all, but in
everything by prayer and petition,
with thanksgiving, make your
requests known to God. Then the
peace of God that surpasses all
understanding will guard your
hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

I had memorized those verses long ago and I've repeated them often. I have even prayed them with others. While looking at these favorite verses and praying, I noticed something new. Immediately preceding "my" verses, were the words, "The Lord is near." Praise God! I was not alone.

As I prayed, "Lord, what do you want me to do?" I was surprised to see that in Philippians (once again) my answer was very clear. Philippians 4:9 says, "Keep on doing what you have learned and received and heard and seen in me. Then the God of peace will be with you." That verse had been right in front of me all along but was only highlighted for me after I asked.

I found that during this very unsettling time Psalm 91 was very comforting. I pray Psalm 91 every night during my evening prayer. I often insert my own name before certain verses. I especially love Psalm 91:11-12, "For he commands his angels with regard to you, to guard you wherever you go. With their hands they shall support you lest you strike your foot against a stone." What a beautiful vision!

A message that I was led directly to while praying is **Deuteronomy 6:4-7**, "The Lord is our God, the Lord alone! Therefore, you shall

love the Lord, your God, with your whole heart, and with your whole being and with your whole strength. Take to heart these words which I command you today. Keep repeating them to your children. Recite them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you get up." Once again, I had very clear instructions from God.

During this time of difficulty, God has often answered my prayers through scripture. He has given me assurance, love and direction. I have marked these verses and return to them often to remind myself that I am not alone. "Do not fear I am with you; do not be anxious: I am your God. I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand." Isaiah

God as my Keeper has been a favorite way of knowing Him for many years now. When I was still a young adult, wrapped up in selfish pursuits, I didn't always realize that God was "keeping" me. Even after making an adult decision to follow Him I was still in need of much conversion. I would rejoice over knowing His great love and as easily find myself in the depths of despair over sin and painful circumstances because I hadn't yet discovered or come to rely upon His grace. I was often in that place of doing things I didn't want to do and not doing what I longed to do. (Romans 7:15-20)

Then, I attended a Catholic Charismatic retreat at Holy Spirit Retreat House in Anchorage and discovered just how God had been my Keeper all those years.

A woman at that retreat, who had suffered greatly when her family was killed during World War II, sat at a dinner table with me and a group of others. She shared her story. As a child, she had escaped to America,

never to see her family again. She was in the middle of inner-healing from this trauma when we met. She had come to the retreat hoping to receive relief. At the end of the meal, still at table, those present began to pray for her. God spoke through me, saying, "I am your Keeper! I have always kept you. Here I am with you today." As I spoke those words into her life, God touched my heart with grace and a deep, knowing joy that He was MY keeper too! In that moment, He wasn't only speaking to her, but to me! In an instant, I came to discover the times God had kept me...kept by His love; kept for a future full of hope; kept in spite of my sins and lacks. I had been loved and graced and kept long before I knew it.
