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To the River, to the Desert, and Beyond

ne of the great Lenten themes of the Church is Jesus in the desert, after He had been baptized. Indeed, the Church's practice of Lenten disciplines for forty days is modeled on the 40 days spent by Christ in the wilderness. The Church is not simply calling us to observe Jesus in the wilderness, but to join Him there. We need to examine this aspect more carefully, not only to see what Jesus does, but to learn the lessons for our own journeys.

The Baptism of Jesus: What an extraordinary experience! The heavens open, the Spirit comes upon Jesus, and the Father's voice proclaims His pleasure and delight in His beloved Son. I don't think we can even comprehend what that moment must have been like for Jesus. Perfect union. Perfect love. The experience of the Holy Spirit.

The Desert Journey: Matthew tells us that it was the Spirit that led Jesus into the desert. Mark tells us that the Spirit actually drove Jesus into the desert! Why the desert?

You recall that the people of Israel spent 40 years in the desert. It was a journey of testing and purification for them. You also remember that Moses spent 40 days on the mountain, being with God and receiving the Law. The 40 days of Jesus in the desert corresponds with these two momentous events. He is the New Israel. He is greater than Moses. He completes what was lacking in those previous journeys.

The desert was always considered by the Jewish people to be the desolate place where evil spirits dwelt. Ironically, the mountains in the desert were often the places where people would encounter God. The desert was a place of testing and purification. It was a place of combat with evil, and with one's own human weakness. To this difficult place Jesus goes, led there... driven there, by the Holy Spirit.

As if the rigors of surviving in this place, not to mention a 40 day fast, were not enough, "the tempter approached Him." Satan laid out three temptations:

- Turn stones into bread
- Throw yourself off the Temple
- Prostrate yourself and worship me.

As in all temptations that are presented man, there was a certain "reasonableness" in these seductions:

Jesus was literally hungry. The 40 day fast had severely weakened Him. What is wrong with taking care of yourself? Eating isn't some extravagant luxury. Be reasonable.

If Jesus threw Himself off the Temple and lived..... what a way to launch a ministry! You would have everyone's attention. You could get people to do anything you wanted them to do. It will also show the world His "anointing." Wouldn't that impress people!

Jesus is invited to worship Satan. If Jesus yields on this point, the devil will give Him all the power and influence in the world. Wouldn't that

veryone I have asked has said that the 2021 Virtual Women's Retreat left them inspired and elated. It truly was "A Spring of Water Flowing in the Parched Land."

By mail, each registrant received the beautifully planned and designed retreat journal that began on the inside cover with Our Retreat Prayer, written by coordinator Mary Pelton. The inside pages had themes and scriptures for each of the four sessions, followed by questions for small groups, preparing retreatants for the flow of the day.

The presenter, Joan Williamson, broadcast her enthusiasm for the Lord and his work in our lives right through the device screens and into our hearts. She led us through the retreat themes, helping us to "go in and go deep, as you are comfortable."

Even though we could not gather in person, we connected with her and our small breakout groups that met in four sessions. We listened to each other and felt love for each one as we shared about this time in our lives. Praise and worship, led by Julia Cox before each session, had many of us standing up in front of our laptops to lift our hands and hearts to the Lord. Julia also led the music for the closing Mass, the second Vigil Mass for Fr. Jim Northrop that Saturday. His homily was an exhortation to trust in the Lord during these challenging times. He and Julia prayed and sang The Blessing over us that night, leaving us with the assurance of the Father's blessing on us and our families.

It was the first time we had done a virtual retreat and it became a whole new training course for everyone involved. Each retreat team member brought what technological knowledge they had and were challenged to learn more in order to bring about the whole event. 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be a good thing? Wouldn't it help Jesus accomplish the mission of bringing the entire world to the Father?

All three temptations offer the amazing, the dramatic, the "reasonable" way to get some things accomplished.

In each case, Jesus resists the bait, and declares His trust in God, rather than expedient solutions.

He was tested. He was obedient to God. He was found to be worthy.

The desert was not only about the temptations. It was also a time of deep communion with the Father. Like Moses on Sinai, Jesus receives in his very being the "new Law, the New Covenant of God" which He will take with Him when He leaves the desert and begins His mission.

The desert is a place of emptying. It is also a place of filling.

Beyond the desert: From the desert, Jesus comes forth to begin His public ministry. His first public words in Matthew's Gospel are a reprise of what John the Baptist proclaimed; "Repent, for the Kingdom of heaven is at hand."

Over the next three years, Christ spoke powerfully about the ways of God, and the need for all of humanity to conform itself to those ways. There is a certain irony here. Signs and wonders accompanied the preaching of Jesus. Was not Satan tempting Him back in the desert to "do the dramatic?" Jesus rejected them in the desert. Now He's performing signs and wonders! Simply put, the desert temptations were solutions offered under "the devil's terms." Jesus rejects that completely. When offered by the Holy Spirit however, Jesus is willing to use the authentic power of God in order to usher in the Kingdom. Please note: The "dramatics" of Satan can often mimic the legitimate works of God be discerning.

What lessons might we take away from this "Exodus" of Jesus; from the river, to the desert, to ministry?

Yet God sends us there [to the desert]. Not to punish us, but to purify us, strengthen us, and ultimately heal us and prepare us for the work of the Kingdom.

At some point, all of us will "go to the wilderness." It usually is not a pleasant, feel-good experience. But it is a necessary part of the journey for any follower of Christ. I spent months in the deserts of Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, and California when I made the journey with the cross across America back in the 90's. Sometimes I was completely alone for days at a time. I recall the advice of the desert fathers, the Christians who went to the desert in the early centuries of Christianity, in imitation of Christ. They said that when you go into the wilderness, you will encounter three realities: the real you, the real devil, and the real God. The real you will nearly drive you mad. The real devil will try to utterly destroy you. The real God will love you, heal you, and draw you close to Himself.

I would have to say that, in my limited experience, I can vouch for the accuracy of that.

The question is: where is your desert? Where is your wilderness? Ultimately it is deep within our hearts, within ourselves. It can be helping a loved one through a sickness. It's a home completely turned upside down by the realities of COVID-19. It can be a loved one "calling you out" for things in your life that you would rather not look at.

No one "wants" to go to the desert. It is difficult..... so very difficult.


Yet God sends us there. Not to punish us, but to purify us, strengthen us, and ultimately heal us and prepare us for the work of the Kingdom.

Many of us think that once "the Dove comes upon us," our problems are over. Now that we are "anointed" everything is going to go our way.

The stark reality is that the Spirit is given to us not only to make us useful in ministry, but to both send us, then assist us, in our own struggles in the desert. It's a necessary aspect of the Christian life that very few people are willing to embrace with their eyes open. Even the struggles, even the testing, can be used by God to strengthen and purify us. In that same place of emptiness, brokenness, and poverty we also find a new and deeper filling.

Tested, humbled, strengthened, and filled—we join Jesus on the journey beyond the desert. ■

me if I allowed him, and my life would not be the same.


