# The Promise of the Father - Acts 1:4

A promise made by God can be trusted, and the Bible is full of promises which are fulfilled in God's time. God promised Abraham that he would have descendants like the stars! God told Moses that he would lead his people to the promised land. In the New Testament, after his resurrection, Jesus told the apostles to "go to Jerusalem and wait for the promise of the Father" (Acts1:4). In all these examples, we see three things before the promises could be fulfilled—patience, obedience and faith.

In Acts 1:14, we read that, before the Holy Spirit came upon the apostles, they got ready: "in one accord, the apostles devoted themselves to prayer." While Jesus taught them that the Holy Spirit was going to be their helper, he didn't provide them with many details. He didn't spend much time talking about the manifestations of the Spirit. Jesus did not want to distract them by these expressions of the Spirit, He wanted them to experience Him! So, with very little understanding on the how, the disciples had to be patient.

They obediently went to Jerusalem, despite the danger. And they prayed in faith, without understanding what was going to happen. The promise also appears in Lk24:49, "I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high." The power mentioned here comes from the Greek word 'dunamis', from which we derive the English word dynamite. It is the same word St. Paul uses in 2 Timothy 1:7, when he writes, "for God gave us a spirit not of fear, but of power (dunamis) and love and selfcontrol."

How does this promise apply to us? We have already received the dunamis of the Holy Spirit at our Baptism and sealed at Confirmation. We must wait prayerfully for Pentecost—to prepare to receive a new infilling, to fan into flame the gifts of the Holy Spirit we have received. We should be obedient and allow the Holy Spirit to work in and through us, at a deeper level. To experience Him! Jesus said, "apart

from me you can do nothing" (Jn 15:5). In the Trinitarian reality, this applies to the Holy Spirit as well. Apart from God, we can do nothing.

Three years ago, at the first Encounter conference at St. Pius, I received a clear message for myself: "Reuben, you are operating on your own strength." I was not allowing the Holy Spirit to work through me. I was not having the impact that God wanted me to

# Pray With Expectation

The Promise of the Father, the Advocate, the Dove, the Wild Goose, the Holy Spirit—these names and titles of the Third Person of the Trinity reveal aspects of the One who is necessary for our sanctification and guidance. It is the Holy Spirit who enables us to do the work of the kingdom of God. Jesus has told us that we will be baptized in the Holy Spirit and fire. It will not be the first time we are filled. Like the apostles, we also receive more than one infilling of the Spirit.

Jesus told the apostles before he ascended "to my God and your God, to my Father and your Father," to "wait for the promise of the Father" ... "but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." Reuben D'Sa explains this waiting in his article on page 1.

# A Calling of Hope: My First WWCCR Women's Retreat Experience

"May the eyes of your hearts be enlightened, that you may know what is the hope to which he has called you." —Ephesians 1:18

Hope: a gift we all yearn for in a world full of change and uncertainty, yet one that can seem desperately hard to find. Christ has promised us the light of his hope, yet why is it so hard to believe that this hope exists for each one of us, especially in times of suffering and trials? At moments in our lives, our faith will be shaken, which is when we must turn to the gift of hope to bring us back to the core of our identity as disciples of Christ: Love.

I read through the retreat information and asked God if he could open the doors necessary for me to go on this retreat if it was his will.

Little did I know, God had an immediate answer to my prayer.

I received a phone call from a friend asking if I had heard about the upcoming women's retreat and, offered to sponsor me to attend this retreat. I was shocked! Praise God for his infinite goodness! Without a second thought, I excitingly responded "yes, I would love to attend!" God heard and answered my prayer, so I knew with all certainty that this retreat was going to be one of many blessings and graces, for God had opened the doors for me to attend. I knew the Lord was preparing to speak to my soul and renew the gift of his hope within my aching heart.

When I arrived on Friday evening, I was so impacted by the great number of women in the room. It was a sea of women and I was looking forward to joining my fellow sisters in Christ for the

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have. I had to learn to surrender to the Holy Spirit more. I invite you to take a step back and learn to rely on the Holy Spirit and be completely docile to His promptings. "Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit" (Zech 4:6). ## From Bitterness to Conversion

I've had a true conversion to the Catholic faith after attending the WWCCR Women's Retreat in February. Before the retreat, I was bitter that my life crumbled back in 2010 when I experienced a lot of personal loss and midlife crisis. I went financially bankrupt and lost the family home to foreclosure. At that same time, I quit my job as a hospice nurse due to compassion fatigue (a syndrome once called burnout). I lost several close family members in addition to managing crises and death on a daily basis in my job. I stopped caring and became overwhelmed with grief. I became very self-destructive.

I went to the Sacrament of Reconciliation before the retreat. The priest went through all the commandments for my examination of conscience. It seems sin can start out as a snowflake and later become an avalanche. Staying away from grace and the Sacraments can harden one's heart. I believe there should be a sign outside the confessional..."come and get your grace." I plan to go more often.

Our small groups fostered safety and connection throughout the weekend. The joy of the women in attendance

was palpable and revitalizing. Many of us had been isolated because of the virus for such a long time that coming together in collective harmony was such a treat.

In Mass, we prayed that those who are marginalized would get their basic needs met and that those who are estranged would find comfort. Before I left Seattle, I got a big hug from my son John. We haven't really spoken in ten years. This felt like a hug from heaven. They said at the retreat that God always shows up!

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weekend. Before we began, I prayed to the Lord and presented my prayer intention for the retreat, which dealt with the situation I had been facing in my life. I aimed high and lifted all that was on my heart to the Lord, while holding nothing back.

The retreat itself was amazing—praise and worship music, prayer, empowering talks from Jan Alkire and Gabby Herndon, bonding time with other women, small group discussions, delicious food and snacks, beautiful nature views, and more.

Saturday night was when everything came together for me and our good Lord answered the prayer that I lifted to him at the start of the retreat. Joining together for Mass and healing prayer, the Holy Spirit was on fire in the chapel, stirring the hearts of many. One of the hearts that was deeply impacted and moved that night was mine—my little, imperfect, aching heart that longed to be held and loved by my Savior.

I was prayed over by two women, and the words they shared with me, which were inspired by the Holy Spirit, directly answered my prayer. Along with this new found wisdom, I experienced a wave of deep peace that surpassed anything of this world. My heart felt renewed by the spring of living water, flowing from the side of Christ, and I once again felt strengthened by the gift of hope.

You see, hope is not dependent on earthly circumstances, but rather, it

is the solid understanding of the promises of Christ, and more so, the joy of his love. Hope is resting your head on the Sacred Heart of Jesus and listening to the words, "I love you, my child" with each of his heartbeats. Hope is putting one foot in front of the other and saying, "Jesus, I trust in you" even when your life seems to be falling apart. Hope is the gift I needed and the gift God granted to me during this women's retreat.

So, my dearest brothers and sisters in Christ, may we take this moment to renew our hope in the Lord together—the Lord who loves us, knows each of us by name, and has called us to bring his love to a world that is aching for him. God Bless!
