On my bookshelf is an old hard bound copy of the *Silmarillion* by J.R.R. Tolkien. It inspired me and began a love of Tolkien that has continued to this day. I was given this book while staying at a host home during our trip to World Youth Day in 2000 in Rome. This was just before the Lord of the Rings movies came out and before I learned about how Tolkien's deep Catholic faith informed his life and his writings. Much of Tolkien's fiction is about journeys, people traveling together, and completing a mission. This book is kind of the back story for all his later writings. What I treasure about this book, in addition to its content, is how it came to me: through a conversation with someone I'd just met who was providing a place to stay for our group while on pilgrimage.

Just as that book was the beginning of my love of Tolkien, that trip to Rome was a beginning of a deeper appreciate for pilgrimage. I've always loved travel but I think being a pilgrim is more about who we are than where we are going. Saint John Paul II stated that the whole of our life is a pilgrimage to the heart of the Father:

*"The whole of the Christian life is like a great pilgrimage to the house of the Father, whose unconditional love for every human creature, and in particular for the 'prodigal son' (cf. Lk 15:11-32), we discover anew each day. This pilgrimage takes place in the heart of each person, extends to the believing community and then reaches to the whole of humanity" (Tertio millennio adveniente, n. 49)*

Let's look at this new year as a year on pilgrimage. Since "this pilgrimage takes place in the heart of each person" we can apply the principles of and preparations for pilgrimage to our daily lives, whether we travel or are staying in our own communities. I was inspired by the

instructions below that were given prior to my pilgrimage to the Holy Land (thanks to Fr. Dave Pivonka) and we can apply these each day, at work, at home, and in our communities:

**We are on pilgrimage as the body of Christ. Pray for the grace to be more aware of the brothers and sisters with whom you are journeying. Seek to serve, love and honor one another.**

3 John 1:5-8 is from a letter to Gaius, who welcomed missionaries spreading the Gospel. The footnotes highlight that this assistance "is a manifestation of his true

Christian faith.” Whether missionaries or the people in our communities, what are some concrete ways we can seek to serve, love and honor one another? Rather than resolutions this year, perhaps we can each make some specific goals and pray to be able to live out these ways more deeply.

**God’s grace is found on the journey not merely the destination. Be present to God’s grace wherever you are.**

Last summer, I made a 3100-mile road trip, first to a National Conference in Rhode Island and then to spend a week camping at Acadia National Park in Maine. While I had specific destinations in mind (and reservations), I was blessed with a couple surprises: lunch with two friends who were staying near my camp in Maine and a detour on the way home which resulted in fellowship with new friends and my first-time sailing. Both were grace-filled encounters that were not part of my “trip plan.” Let’s pray to be able to recognize these moments of grace that God puts in our daily life.

**On pilgrimage there is the tension between being “busy” and seeing “everything” and slowing down a bit in order to pray and reflect. Pray to be able to encounter the Lord wherever you are.**

I don’t know about you but this tension between “busy” and “slowing down” is not restricted to pilgrimage or travel. In my day at work, in my life at home, taking the time to be present to the Lord can be challenging. How can we “pray always without becoming weary.” There is a parable in Luke 18:1-8 about a widow who wears down the judge because of her persistence. It’s easy for us to be persistent when there is a pressing need, like the widow’s judgment, or when we have a loved one with a health issue. In our day-to-day life, I think this is translated into being intentional. The Liturgy of the Hours is an amazing way to recognize God’s presence at specific times of the day. Many of us don’t have the opportunity stop in the middle of our workday or family life for this depth of prayer, but all of us can encounter the Lord throughout the day. I have a Fitbit that reminds me every hour to get up and walk 250 steps. Perhaps we can set up a reminder to spend a couple minutes in prayer throughout the day. Bonus: do them at the same time! This might also be a witness to those around you who will benefit from the fruit of this prayer in your life.

**Trust that the Lord is present in all the situations.**

I recently heard a talk on Trust and Hope. The speaker shared the song “Promises” by Maverick City Music, which talks about

God’s faithfulness throughout history: “You have proven You’ll do just what you said.” Scripture is full of how God has been faithful in the past and that his faithfulness continues. Trust is an action more than a feeling; it is a step of faith. Let’s take this action, even if we don’t feel it, knowing that our Lord will not leave us abandoned.

**Accept what the Lord brings when he brings it. This includes snacks, water, bathrooms and prayer times.**

This last point is very practical. Our relationship with Jesus is not limited to times of pilgrimage, Mass, or even Adoration. Jesus wants to be present to us every minute of every day, if we let him. His blessings come at unexpected times so our challenge is to be able to see what the Lord provides and accept it in the moment. Sometimes the Lord is asking us to surrender in one area so that he can bless us in another. In this new year let’s give God permission to move even deeper in our lives, in our communities, for our sake and for the sake of those around us. Let’s renew our “Yes” to him and to his plan and allow ourselves to be surprised by the Holy Spirit! ■

# Let The Fire Fall!

(This is Fr. Jay DeFolco's exhortation to the 45th Anniversary participants held November 19th at St. Pius X Church, Montlake Terrace, WA. )

In the spring of 1975, I attended my first prayer group in the school at St Luke. My sister-in-law Judy invited me. I remember feeling at home there, praising God. My family was going through difficult times and for the first time in a long time I felt peace and joy. A man

named Howie knelt down next to me and began praying, asking the Holy Spirit to come upon me. He kept crying out to the Lord, "Lord, let the fire fall!"

There was something powerful about that prayer. Was he calling for the fire of Mt. Carmel where Elijah took on the false prophets of Baal? Who knows? But it was a fire of

spiritual awakening that exploded. The fervent prayer was simply, "Lord, let the fire fall!"

Do you know that prayer of 47 years ago is as relevant today? We need a spirit of revival to burn through our church, ignite our churches and purify our lives so that we can be instruments of God in a world of darkness. We need a revival from God. Billy Graham has said, "A revived condition should be the normal." We should have a spirit of revival daily in our lives.

In his book, "The Spark that Ignites," Robert Coleman gives to us the condition of the church today, "People everywhere are sensing something is missing in the life of the church. We go through the motions of religion but there is no power. The joy of the Lord has leaked out. There is no spring in our step, no shout in our soul, a spiritless boredom is the norm!"

Many in our churches have grown dull in the things of God. The psalmist begins to pray: "Will you not revive us again that your people may rejoice in you?" (Psalm 85:6) He recognized the people were spiritually impotent. The fires of devotion were burning low. Their joy was gone. The cry comes, "Lord, revive us! Lord, let the fire fall!" God's desire is to send revival.

Ask most Christians, "What do you think of when you hear the word revival?" Some will say singing, preaching, a series of meetings. Others will say a week to whip up interest in the church. Still others will comment, "it's some kind of religious emotionalism."

Look at Psalm 86:11-13. Revival is bringing one into a deeper walk with

God. Revival is bringing one back into obedience. Revival is allowing God to work fresh in our lives. The word revive means to quicken or to bring back to life. It is the movement of God in the heart of his people. It is not man-made or program driven, instead it reigns from above.

Richard Owen Roberts says, "Revival is an extraordinary movement of God which produces extraordinary spiritual results." In other words, revival is a move of God. Ten seconds in the presence of God will accomplish more than all the human efforts of all time combined. Revival is not what you can contrive, connive or commence. It is allowing God to send his revival fire in our lives. Revival is not the activity of man but the action of almighty God. It is allowing the supernatural God to bring about his will, his plan in your life and mine.

Remember, revival means to wake up and live. In the Old Testament it comes from the word which means to live. It is like breath. It means to have the breath of God flowing in our lives. In the New Testament, the word means to live again. It conveys the idea of the penitent prodigal who returns to the father's house. (Luke 15) Once he lived in the midst of the blessings of his father, only to awaken to realize sin has digressed him to the pig pen of life. To be revived is to allow the freshness of the Spirit's work in our lives and allow the Spirit to rekindle the slow-dying fire. Revival is returning to the nature and the purpose for which we were saved. It brings us into the power, the purpose and the presence of almighty God.

That is exactly what revival does! It awakens our hearts to the presence of God. Believers who experience awakening, are no longer content to fill the margins of their Bibles with great insight. Rather, they become eager to get the Word in their daily lives. Once this happens, there is birthed within a driving desire to be obedient to the Lordship of Christ.

WWCCR has been spreading God's love for 45 years. Prayer groups have come and gone. New leaders have come forward.

Retreats continue to be offered. Life with the Spirit retreats continue to change lives. The spark is still here, lighting fires in lives and in our communities. I truly believe that God has been calling us to a maturity of our spiritual walk. In the midst of the noise and craziness of our world, God has been calling us to the quiet and stillness and to recognize the gentle breeze of God's presence. Even Jesus went off to pray by himself to be in the presence of his heavenly Father. The Charismatic Renewal is alive and well and the fire is still waiting to be discovered.

Today we give thanks to God for the gift of 45 years of WWCCR. We give thanks for all who have served in ministry over the years. May the Fire fall anew in our lives and within our communities. Let the Fire Fall! ■


