EQUIPPING THE HOLY ONES FOR MINISTRY

We are facing challenging times. The call of being a disciple is not an easy one and Jesus told us, "In the world you will have trouble, but take courage, I have conquered the world" (John 16:33). That is why St. Paul spent his life in service to the Lord writing his letters to the Christian communities and encouraging people to understand that God calls and equips us for the work of his Kingdom.

Nearly everyone in the bible (with the exception of the Blessed Virgin Mary) felt their inadequacy when they received their calling. Moses questioned who was he to lead the Israelites out of Egypt (Exodus 3:11) and Jeremiah felt that he was too young and didn't know how to speak (Jeremiah 1:6). Saying "yes" to the Lord initiates a trust relationship where we learn that God will give us everything we need to serve him.

This doesn't mean that we always do things perfectly. I recently was reading Psalm 30 where David stated "Complacent, I once said, 'I shall never be shaken'" (Ps. 30:7). We know that David made many

mistakes, but he learned about the mercy of God and being accountable for his actions. God honored his steadfast heart and taught him

through those mistakes. The opening prayer for 26th Sunday of Ordinary Time caught my attention this year. Here is the part that really made an impact on me: "O God, who manifest your almighty power above all by pardoning and showing mercy...". Isn't that amazing! God shows his power through forgiving our sins and showing mercy.

In order for us to experience the equipping that God has for us, we first and foremost must acknowledge that "apart from him we can do nothing" (John 15:5). We need to be more reliant on the Lord and seek the spiritual gifts that he has

given us for the up-building of the Body of Christ (Eph. 4:11-16). Spending time with the Lord in quiet is essential for us to discern properly what the Lord wants us to do and to allow him to give us the necessary graces and gifts to follow his plan. Some people feel guilty when taking time away from their busy lives for prayer and reflection. We are all striving for balance in our lives, but the world is out of

control with doing and producing. St. Teresa of Calcutta said, "The fruit of silence is prayer, the fruit of prayer is faith, the fruit of faith is love, the fruit of love is service and the fruit of service is peace." Being grounded and rooted in prayer is essential for equipping us for ministry.

Another thing that I think is very important is having small groups and forming spiritual friendship with people. I have been blessed to have enjoyed some powerful gatherings with friends who have shared with me how the Lord came through and strengthened them in the midst of great struggles. One friend recalled how God used him while he was seriously ill to reach

out to the people who came in and out of his hospital room. I remembered that St. Paul declared, "Therefore, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and constraints, for the sake of Christ; for when I am weak, then I am strong" (2 Corinthians 12:10). The person speaking with me was a living reflection of this truth and I left the conversation feeling inspired and refreshed. When we share our faith we help others get equipped to face their own challenges.

Recently, we had a listening session for our Partners in the Gospel program. As I anticipated, people were anxious and fearful about the possible changes we will have to go through in the future. I totally understand that. I really felt the Lord asking me to listen but also to encourage people that this is a normal human response to challenging situations. I ended our session with the story of the Road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) and how Jesus helped them understand by breaking open the Scriptures and in the Breaking of the Bread. The Lord equips all of us to face the challenges of life with confidence through the gift of the Mass. It is our lifeline.

Wonderful opportunities are on the horizon to continue the mission. Let's get ready for a sovereign move of the Holy Spirit as the Lord equips us for ministry.

Whether it is the first time you have attended a WWCCR Women's Retreat, or you have attended many retreats, it is our hope that as you turn into the driveway of the Retreat Center at Palisades, a sense of anticipation rises within you. The Retreat Planning Team will have spent many hours in prayer and planning to make your retreat a success.

Within a few weeks after the previous retreat, the eight-member Planning Team gathers on a zoom call to review the Evaluations. We really do look at the comments you share.

Prayer guided by the Holy Spirit gives us a theme scripture. With this decision we can really begin to bring various parts of the retreat to life. Suggestions are then made for a speaker. The Planning Team Coordinator begins to contact these candidates and

when a person accepts the invitation to lead the retreat, another major goal is completed.

Many different projects are worked on at the same time throughout the summer and fall. Artwork for all retreat materials is chosen and finalized. The decorations in the Chapel which reflect the theme are a major project. Our hope is that these decorations are a visual blessing.

Once the registration form is published in the Gleanings, the team is focused on final preparations. Name tags are created, ready to be printed. Each year we provide the attendees with a bookmark or small memento gift. The format for a note-taking journal is finalized and printed. A welcome/confirmation letter is written containing special instructions. The music ministry has chosen inspiring and meaningful music, and any special activities for the retreat are completed. The final big project is coordinating room reservations.

In the end, the team hopes that all the little details draw you into a deeper experience with the Lord.
