JESUS 2023 IN KANSAS CITY

There are so many blessings available for us to experience in a life of the Spirit. In October 2023 there were seven people from Western Washington who attended the Jesus 2023 National Leaders Conference held at the Savior Pastoral Center in Kansas City, Kansas, hosted by Pentecost Today USA (formerly known as the National Service Committee). This is the first full conference they have been able to offer since COVID so there was excitement in the air.

Another underlying inspiration was that in 1977 there was a big ecumenical conference with almost 40,000 people, meeting in Arrowhead Stadium in Kansas City (and more than half the participants were Catholic!) This was a pivotal event that brought Pentecostals and Catholic Charismatics together in one time of praise, worship and, teaching. There was an amazing sense of unity among the people gathered at that event.

Now, 46 years later, there is still an excitement in God's people. This year, this conference gave inspired teaching and hands-on ministry experiences as a way for people in the Renewal now to get connected and equipped to carry on the mission of Jesus Christ. There was an evening

of reconciliation and healing, a time for street evangelization, and several opportunities for anointed praise and worship. The Jesus 2023 conference was challenging and inspiring. I'd like to share with you the impressions and lessons learned from some of our conference goers.

As soon as my sister, Barbara, and I pulled into the parking lot on Friday night, we felt the Holy Spirit! First, we noticed Dr. Ralph Martin walking near the space we chose to park. My sister was so excited to see him, she rolled down her window and greeted him. He came over to our car and we chatted. Next a couple from Tennessee drove up and we chatted with them. They had a bumper sticker: I believe in Miracles. The wife's name was Providence. Then a lady from Topeka, who was driving an hour each day to attend the conference, visited with us. All this before we even got out of the parking lot! Once inside the large Savior Pastoral Center, the praise & worship was phenomenal. The highlights of the conference for me included:

Ralph Martin's keynote talk entitled: The Body of My Son is Broken. It was very sobering. He spoke about the conference at Arrowhead Stadium in 1977, which I had attended as a 24-year-old from Texas.

Father Peter Emanuel shared his amazing story of founding Opus Novum—new work. Opus Novum Catholic Charismatic Renewal is a collegiate community founded at Duquesne University in 2018. Their scripture verse is Isaiah 43:19, "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

I was touched by **Missy Edwards** from the International House of Prayer, who led a Prophetic

Bishop Peter Smith, Homilist at the Saturday Conference Mass:

God created unity in the garden. He wants that unity back. He leads it through the Holy Spirit calling us back through radical conversion. His love calls us back, renewing creation in the Holy Spirit. Restore unity through witnessing by living your life radically. Joan of Arc said, "I am not afraid for God is with me. I was born for this." You too were made for such a time as this. Drink of one Spirit, the Holy Spirit, in prayer and in community.

Father Boniface Hicks OSB, Speaker:

St. John Paul II tells us creation's high point was Adam. Solitude for Adam was real. It was not good for man to be alone. Eve was created

"bone of my bone and flesh of my flesh." Relationship happened, two freedoms in a communion of persons an image of God. From the solitude of Adam to the communion of persons. It's

hard to live those relationships.
Becoming one body, one spirit in relationship, is hard to do with folks who have free will. Those who become one body, one spirit are members living in Christ.

We must "drink of one Spirit." See how they love one another. Each person has a story, a heart hurting with sin. When we are vulnerable, and naked, we are better in community. The Holy Spirit makes a community, not a group. All in community can drink of the same Spirit. Sharing stories, wounds and successes is vital. Covering up our sin with pride, control, hiding or running away is not being Christ.

Drinking of the same Spirit: What does that look like in community?

Be one to one with Jesus, with prayer as the foundation of the community. Risk to be loved for who you really are, trust the community. Make room for new members and put energy into welcoming new members. Give yourself entirely to Jesus, never lowering your holy and Godly standards.

The Holy Spirit is relationship. In community we get pressed, held together, in the Holy Spirit. With Jesus we have all that we need to be led by him, to drink of one Spirit.

Where are our Catholics? The youth have been carried off into captivity. Civil laws make Church tradition hard to follow, but Church tradition must be followed.

- Break with culture! Love holiness and purity (1 Pt 1). You must be holy as I am holy. God gives grace for you to live holy and pure lives.
- Let evangelization consume your life! Die repenting of your sin. Care about God. Seek him. Live in the light of conscience and grace. Do not be led astray. Folks need to hear the Gospel.
- Jesus wants no bargains but unconditional surrender. My life is his.
- Mary, Our Mother asks us to "Pray and offer sacrifice for souls."

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• Pray. Meditate. There is no limit to what God can do.

Imagine being in a room with several hundred people who are unashamedly on fire with love for God, united in singing praise to the Father, while praying in the Spirit, and adoring Jesus who is exposed on the altar in the center of the room, gazing back at all those who are reflecting and magnifying his love. This was the epitome of the Jesus Conference.

The Jesus Conference was my first encounter with the charismatic movement on a national scale, and it was both inspirational and empowering. God showed me how I'm often tempted to withdraw back into the small bubble of what I know-Western Washington, my own parish, my family—and I manage to convince myself that my missions and ministries aren't that big in the grand scheme of things. I find myself thinking: this is only a small retreat for local women who I am ministering to, or this is only another moment with my kids that I've had and will have a million times. This conference was a jump start to remind me that God doesn't do "only"!

Tasting a bit of the Renewal on a national scale opened my eyes to remind me that every moment, every ministry, every mission without a doubt belongs to God, and he is doing incredible things with me and through me. Yes, the Women's Retreat serves women of Western

Washington, but it opens up the door for an earth-shattering encounter with God, which then allows the women to go back home and open the door for the Holy Spirit to work in incredible ways in their churches, in their communities, and in their families. Yes, a discussion with my kids is one of many in the day of a homeschooling mom, but they will remember that encounter, and they'll share their thoughts with a friend in whose heart a little spark might be lit for the first time. The Holy Spirit is spreading like wildfire,

and he's using me and you to do it—if we let him!

This world needs God now more than ever, and you and I were born "for such a time as this" (Esther 4:14). Have you ever asked God why he chose you for this moment, these people, this place to be his witness? What does he want of you? And when he answers, will you be who God meant you to be, and set this world on fire?

Fr. Jim Northrop spoke on equipping us for ministry, reminding us that God searches for us. When we take on Christ we become a child of God, dignified, us to seek the Holy Spirit led by the Spirit of

Conversion is ongoing. There is a cost to Pentecost. (Rom 8:18) Because of our brokenness, confusion and need for healing, our hearts and minds will suffer, turning us away from God. Seek the

anointing of the Holy Spirit with a spirit of discernment. The Holy Spirit heals us through repentance. Being devoid of the Holy Spirit is the cause

of division. Repent and convert daily through the Examen. God can write straight with a crooked line. You need a Savior. Know the word of Godthe truth which is Jesus. Know the lives of the saints. Know that God is faithful in every generation. (Ps 25:7) God is merciful because of your goodness as his child.

Pray for the grace of deep surrender, like Our Lady, say, "Be it done to me." Trust in the glory that is to

come. Jesus has given us Our Lady as a model of faith, courage and perseverance. There is a sweetness in walking with the Lord on the journey to glory. Jesus is all we need.
