

ENCOURAGEMENT AND CHALLENGE FROM POPE FRANCIS

Pope Francis Addresses to CHARIS and to the Italian Renewal in the Spirit Movement

Throughout the history of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal (CCR), every Pope has offered words of support and encouragement in various meetings with many different gatherings of CCR that have happened over the past 57 years. In the past six months, Pope Francis has addressed two different groups of leaders in CCR. Last November, he met with CHARIS, the organization that serves CCR at the international level. In January of this year, he addressed the Italian leaders of CCR. Both of these addresses have encouragement and challenges for those of us who are interested in CCR on the local level, here in the Archdiocese of Seattle.

In his address to CHARIS, he urged an emphasis on evangelization through the promotion of Life in the Spirit Seminars. Here at WWCCR, we have been offering these as a one-day retreat which we have called Life with the Holy Spirit Retreats, including a follow-up gathering four weeks later.

Here are some portions of that address:

"One goal [that I have encouraged] is to expand the "Life in the Spirit Seminars" in all places and for everyone. These are truly kerygmatic moments, opportunities for the "initial proclamation" of the Gospel. They make it possible for people to encounter the living Jesus, in his word and his Spirit, and at the same time to experience his Church as a welcoming environment, a place of grace, reconciliation and rebirth. That is why I have encouraged you to make these Seminars more widely available. Today I would ask you: are the Life in the Spirit Seminars being offered in a variety of ecclesial contexts, in small and more remote places, and among the poor and on the peripheries? Each of you can answer this in your hearts. ... Even small parish groups and local leaders can organize them and present them to people in their area.

"The Life in the Spirit Seminars are often an engaging and transformative experience that becomes a turning point in people's lives. A

turning point: after a Seminar, people change course! None-theless, they are only a beginning, like a fire that burns very intensely but risks dying out unless it is continually fed. Precisely for this reason, the Seminars need to be followed up by suitable methods of continuing formation that can fan into

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flame the graces received and encourage ongoing growth in faith and prayer, the moral and sacramental life, the practice of charity and cooperation in the Church's mission."

Pope Francis also emphasizes the need to promote the exercise of charisms, not only in CCR but in the whole Church. He again emphasizes the need for continual growth in holiness. He says:

"To promote charisms, we must follow the one who is the Teacher in promoting charisms: the Holy Spirit. Let us think of the morning of Pentecost: there was great disorder, no one understood anything; yet the Holy Spirit himself brought harmony to that great diversity. And he is the Teacher who teaches us how to promote charisms. This is especially the case for charisms that serve evangelization and missionary activity aimed above all at those who do not yet know Christ.

"It should not be taken for granted that once someone has received baptism in the Spirit that he or she is already fully Christian. The path to holiness always involves growth in personal conversion and in the generous gift of oneself, a gift to Christ and to others, not merely in a sense of spiritual consolation."

In his address to the Italian leaders, he emphasized the importance of focusing on prayer and evangelization. Here are excerpts of what he said:

"By its very nature, the charismatic movement gives space and emphasis to prayer, in particular to prayer of praise, and this is very important. In a world dominated by a culture of having and efficiency, and in a Church that is sometimes too concerned with organization we all need to make room for thanksgiving, for praise and for wonder at God's grace. I ask you, brothers and sisters, to continue to serve the Church in this, especially by promoting the prayer of adoration. An adoration in which silence is predominant, in which the Word of God prevails over our words; in short, an adoration in which he, the Lord, is at the center, not ourselves.

"This is the first aspect for which I thank you and encourage you: that of prayer. The second is that of evangelization, which also belongs, so to speak, to the DNA of the charismatic movement. The Holy Spirit, welcomed in the heart and in life, cannot but open us, move us, make us go outwards: the Spirit always urges us to communicate the Gospel, to go out, and he does so with his inexhaustible imagination. What we have to do is be docile and collaborate with him, as the Acts of the Apostles tell us of Stephen, Philip, Barnabas, Peter, Paul and the others. They did not have a manual for how to proceed: it was the Spirit that moved them and they did many great things. And always remember that the first proclamation is made through the witness of life! What use are long prayers and many beautiful hymns, if I do not know how to be patient with my neighbor, if I do not know how to be close to my mother who is alone? It is the fourth commandment: I am scandalized by men and women who do not go to visit their parents in retirement homes—or that person in difficulty... Real charity, hidden service, is always the proof of our proclamation. Words, gestures and canticles without the substance of charity, will not do.

"...the Renewal community must be at the service of the entire diocesan community, the entire parish community, in accordance with the bishop's pastoral indications. Communion also with the other ecclesial realities, associations, movements, groups: bearing witness to fraternity, mutual respect in diversity, collaboration in commitment to joint initiatives, service to the people of God and also in relation to social questions in which the dignity of people is at stake."

MY FIRST RETREAT

I was meant to be there. In hindsight I can see the Lord's hand working. Jean Beers asked me if I would like to go with her and I said, "Yes" (What?!! Who said that?!! I don't do retreats!!)

The first evening, wonderful praise and worship and the question, "Where or how do I want to be transformed by God's love this weekend?" In the chapel I received from the Lord the single word, "Barrier." (Hmmm, Lord, what?) But, yes, I had been feeling spiritually distant from the Lord lately. There was something, nothing big, more of a distracting barrier between us.

Saturday morning: the angels were singing!!! "Well, actually it was the wonderful women of the music ministry singing their wake up songs... but they sounded like angels!" This was a foretaste of the amazing day to come. More praise and worship (can there ever be enough? Noooo!") Then the second talk from Fr. Jim (Fr. Jim, I could happily listen to you all day! ...with breaks of course!)

One visual exercise really hit home... As I remember it (and

maybe my hearing was spiritually modified) we were asked to close our eyes and then visualize "What is keeping you from being closer to the Lord?" And there it was, my "barrier," that looked like boards, except, Jesus' hands were reaching through it. We were asked to remove whatever it was. I pushed it aside and fell into Jesus's waiting arms! (Sorry, slight pause here, because I am crying, again! Love you, Lord!)

From this point on the Lord continued to reassure me. During "drenching prayer" (they don't ask for more of the Spirit for you, but that you are DRENCHED in the Spirit! Love it.) I wasn't expecting any more than a prayer (boy, was I wrong). The instant her hands hit my shoulders, I could feel the heat. At one point I felt something go through my left side and it was as if I had stepped on a buzzer (wow, something is happening here!) Then, very quietly, the person praying for me said, "The Lord is having quite the dance with you." (Wow, Lord, lots to ponder here). And, it wasn't just me. All around the Spirit was in full force reaching out to everyone! (If there was some kind of spiritual monitor that could be seen, I'm sure they

could see this from space that night! Praise God!)

The Lord wasn't done with me yet. During 4am Adoration (yes, I love Adoration of my Lord that much) while quietly sitting with

the heat going off and on, I started smelling incense. (Ah, it must just be years of incense residue coming out of the woodwork). But I sat anticipating the heat coming back on and when it did, there was no incense this time. (Lord, I don't know what this means, maybe a reminder that you are here with me now and always. Love you, Lord!)

One more blessing the Lord gave me was the fellowship. Never have I had the experience of being in the company of so many beautiful, loving and God-loving women! That was the only sadness, saying goodbye to them.

The final entry for the weekend in my workbook was, "The Lord has encouraged me to seek more, step closer, stir up the Spirit, continue to knock down any barriers that spring up (knowing that Jesus will be there with an all consuming hug!) and to learn to dance unrestrained with the Lord!

God willing, I will be there next year (yay!!). And, by the way, this was no retreat... this was a battle and VICTORY!

There was nothing more to write as my mind, body, heart and soul gently rested in the Holy Spirit. Praise God for his healing before, during and after the retreat. I now cope with the symptoms of my TBI much better and wounds of confusion and betrayal have been surrendered to God. In the name of Jesus, may God help and heal us all!
